FOSTERING DEMOCRACY IN THE WAKE OF ATROCITY (NORWAY)




- After meeting with our hosts Martin Alexaksander Eivik and Margareth Kristine luell-Heitmann we were driven to upper-secondary school Greåker videregående.
- The day set off with a delicious breakfast prepared by Øystein S. Levinson's class of English language and culture.
- Students engaged teachers in entertaining games, during which the Norwegian language and culture were explored.







- Later in the day, Martin's students interviewed the visiting teachers on matters concerning their country's history. Our group was interviewed on the matter of Cyprus' division and whether we believe that Greek Cypriots and Turkish Cypriots can live unified together. This consisted an example of the PBL method.
- At a later stage, the students presented their findings in a form of a podcast or a PowerPoint presentation.
- The night ended with the viewing of the film 22 July



















- The day started with a visit at Fredrikstad's local library.
- The Vice Mayor gave a brief presentation of Frendrikstad's history and its development throughout the centuries.
- Erik Lindbæk Kruse, a social worker, presented aspects of his role on preventative work against extremism and the integration of young people in Norway's society. We discussed matters concerning young people with conflicting background, extremist ideas, as well as matters of inclusivity and equality.









- In the afternoon, Lars Thoresen, a history teacher at Greåker, guided us to an exploration of the old town of Fredrikstad.
- The night ended with some of us attending the "Yule" concert at Fredrikstad Cathedral, where students of the school participated in a Christmas music concert.






Østfold University College, Halden:
